William Joseph Klaus, 82, of Manteno, Illinois, passed away peacefully on February 5, 2026.

Born April 3, 1943, and raised in Chicago, Illinois, Bill lived a life centered on family, faith, humility, and doing what needed to be done without seeking attention for it. He was a son, brother, uncle, devoted husband, loving father, and friend — whose presence was reassuring, whose humor was constant, and whose way of moving through life taught more than words ever could. His faith and devotion to family were the foundation of his life and guided the way he treated others.

He found happiness in simple, honest things that helped define who he was: hunting and fishing, time outdoors, gardening, landscaping, and working with his hands. He could build or repair nearly anything and was always ready to help someone who needed it. He loved watching old movies, especially Westerns, and held a deep respect for Native American history and culture. He admired the strength, traditions, and simplicity of life and sought to live with that same appreciation for nature and self-reliance.

Music came naturally to him — guitar, harmonica, accordion, organ, or almost any instrument placed in his hands — along with singing, writing songs and poetry, and enthusiastically cooking meals meant to be shared. He enjoyed telling jokes, performing small magic tricks, and bringing laughter into a room. He carried a quick wit and an easy sense of humor that people never forgot. Though often reserved, he stood firmly for truth and honor and believed things

should be done the right way. When it mattered, he spoke up without hesitation, often advocating for those who could not stand up for themselves. As a young man, he proudly served in the United States Navy during the Vietnam War and endured captivity as a prisoner of war. After returning home, he chose a life focused on family, faith, and everyday responsibilities. He was also a Freemason and valued brotherhood, integrity, and helping others — principles he practiced far more than he spoke about.

He is survived by his wife, Carolyn L'dora Klaus Sr. (née Dudek); his daughter, Carolyn L'dora Klaus Jr.; his sister, Elizabeth Shipp (Klaus); as well as many friends and extended family members who will miss him dearly.

He was preceded in death by his father, Rudolph Klaus; his mother, Barbara Klaus (Voves); and his sisters, Beatrice Jakubowski (Klaus), June Haus (Klaus), and Joan Fasel (Klaus).

The family asks that remembrance be made through acts of kindness in his honor, or through donations to organizations supporting the health and well-being of military veterans and their families.

He will be remembered for the way he lived — faithfully, capably, and with compassionate love and care for the people around him.
